
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Joggins Fossil Institute Cliff Notes E-Newsletter Autumn 2021











THE SUMMER IN REVIEW

Once again, the COVID-19 lockdown delayed our season, and we welcomed guests back to the Centre on June 16. Additional complications to opening included a running series of beach access delays that were finally sorted out on opening day.

At the beginning of the season the only visitors on site were those contained in the Atlantic Bubble. As the Summer progressed, and boarder measures relaxed, we could welcome back guests from various Canadian provinces. In the fall, our visitor origin statistics will be compiled, at this time, however, we can say anecdotally that the parking lot featured plenty of Ontario, Quebec, and the occasional Alberta license plate (these being our typical high traffic provinces outside the Maritimes).

We are still adapting to changes imposed by COVID-19 regulations and procedures. Some positive and, possibly, long overdue changes have resulted from these actions. We finally committed to an online tour booking system, primarily to afford guests as much certainty to their visit as possible. It also allows our staff to better plan the daily and weekly schedules. Our opening hours for the public changed from 9:30 am-5:30 pm to 10:00 am-5:00 pm. Note that no staff hours were cut in this process. It simply meant that, instead of starting their day at either 9:00 or 10:00 am, all staff now begin at 9:30 am. (we schedule 30 minutes on either end of the day tp open/close.) Two positive changes, during a difficult time, that will likely be permanent improvements.

The 2020 season was, again, accomplished with a skeleton crew of staff, a result of uncertain visitor traffic combined with stringent funding conditions. And, again, JFI can point to the front facing staff (our guides, admission personnel, custodial, grounds keeping) as the key to this success. If a positive review is posted online, or more importantly, a guest leaves with a wonderful memory of their visit, it is entirely thanks to interactions with our staff!



EDUCATION & OUTREACH

September 20-26, 2021 is Science Literacy Week. According to the website, http://www.scienceliteracy.ca/, this special week showcases "the many ways kids and families can explore and enjoy the diversity of Canadian science. Libraries, museums, science centers, schools and not-for-profits come together to highlight the books, movies, podcasts and events that share exciting stories of the science, discoveries and ingenuity shaping our lives. It's about each and everyone's unique relationship with science and how they live it."

At the Joggins Fossil Center we are celebrating Science Literacy Week for the sixth year,

with a presentation by author Sandra Phinney, "Risk Takers and Innovators" on Thursday, September 23 at 11:00 am.

Sandra will discuss a number of Canadian inventors and their inventions, including George Klein, "Canada's Edison" who is credited with approximately 2000 inventions, like the motorized wheelchair; Bill Boyle from Amherst, NS, who co-created the Charge Coupled Device (CCD) which let to developments in video and digital photography, HD television, and deep space exploration; and Gina Gallant who invented PolyAggreRoad (PAR) a road paving substance composed of asphalt, crushed rock and plastic waste. She came up with that idea when she was thirteen years old.

"Risk Takers and Innovators" will be available for viewing on the Joggins Fossil Institute's Facebook and website after the live event, for those who are unable to attend.

This event is part of ArtScape Artist-In-Residence programme and supported generously by the Municipality of the County of Cumberland.
